## LOSTWITHIEL PLAYGROUND COMMUNITY CONSULTATION THE RESULTS

"Lost In Play' is a community group that has recently formed to work with the Town Council in order to raise enough funds to significantly improve Lostwithiel's playgrounds, in particular the King George V reserve and Coulson Park. It was decided that the best way to consult the community and ascertain their requirements and ideas for any play area improvements was by way of a questionnaire. We had a fantastic response to the survey; with a total of 86 respondents, representing 17.68% of the distribution, **so thank you very much for your support!** 



Of the 86 respondents 15% said they were happy with the current play area provision in the town, while 85% said they were not happy with it. However all of the respondents aged 6 and under also indicated via their responses to the rest of the questionnaire that significant improvements were needed.

The Town Council acknowledges that Lostwithie's current play facilities are unsatisfactory and has duly set aside funds to contribute to their improvement. Lost In Play, the community group organizing this venture have used the findings of this questionnaire to draw up plans for the two playgrounds. They are now actively working towards raising the remaining funds needed to make the plans a reality.
