RECIPES

FLAPJACKS

*125grams Butter
5 tablespoons golden syrup
one teaspoon ground ginger*

*125grams Demerara sugar
225grams Porridge Oats*

Melt butter or margarine in a large pan and stir in the sugar and syrup. Add the porridge oats and ground ginger and mix well. Press mixture into a greased 8" sandwich tin and smooth over the top. Bake for twenty minutes at 190°C/170°C fan / 375°F/ Gas Mk 5 . Cool for fifteen minutes in tin, then mark top into eight wedges. Cool completely, turn out and break into the marked wedges.

MARBLE CAKE

*6ozs soft margarine
three beaten eggs
1½ level teaspoons baking powder
one tablespoon hot water
6ozs caster sugar
6ozs self raising flour
one level teaspoon cocoa
few drops of cochineal (pink) food colouring*

Place the fat, sugar, beaten eggs , flour and baking powder in a large bowl and beat together for about two minutes until blended and smooth. Put about one third of mixture in another bowl and add cochineal colouring till pink. Mix the cocoa with the hot water and stir till smooth. Add this to half of the remaining mixture, stir till smooth. Grease a 7½ – 8" round cake tin and line with greased greaseproof paper. Put spoonfuls of the cocoa mixture around the tin., then fill the gaps with spoonfuls of remaining colours. Smooth over the top. Bake at 180 °C/160°C fan/325 °F/ Gas Mk 4 for about 45 – 50 minutes till well risen and golden brown (top will spring back when touched lightly with fingertips). Turn out to cool on wire rack.
